# Lynchmere Common Trail

## *The heathland wanderer*

The path leads through a lightly wooded area with views to the surrounding lowland heath where heather blooms in late summer. It is 480m long (approximately quarter of a mile) and has at its end a bench and a viewpoint. From here you can see a wide stretch of countryside lying to the north west of Lynchmere and looking towards Selbourne Hanger. The commons are home to many species of plants and animals including dartford warblers, wood larks, roe deer, foxes, rabbits, lizards, butterflies, bats and moths.

The trail is a smooth, almost totally level path for wheelchair users, parents with pushchairs and the elderly.

### HOW TO GET THERE

**By car:** The entrance to the path can be found beside the Common's notice board on the west side of the road that runs between the B2131 (Haslemere to Liphook road) and Lynchmere village.
