Making a representation on Clapham Neighbourhood Development Plan

All representations made on the Clapham Neighbourhood Development Plan (CNDP) will be passed on to an independent examiner to consider as part of the examination of CNDP. Neighbourhood Plans are not examined in the same manner as Local Plans. Importantly, the examiner is required to consider whether the neighbourhood development plan meets four basic conditions, which state neighbourhood plans should:

- have regard to national policies and advice contained in guidance issued by the Secretary of State
- contribute to the achievement of sustainable development
- be in general conformity with the strategic policies contained in the development plan for the area
- be compatible with EU obligations and human rights requirements.

Therefore it is recommended that any representation should relate to these matters above.

What happens next?

The consultation ends on Friday 2 October. The next stages for the CNDP are:

Stage	Timescale & further details
Examiner appointment	Appointed
Examination	Directly following the end of the consultation. Expected to take 4 weeks.
Examiner issues final report	 The examiner makes one of the following recommendations (November): that the Neighbourhood Plan should proceed to Referendum, on the basis that it meets all legal requirements; that the Neighbourhood Plan, as modified, should proceed to Referendum; that the Neighbourhood Plan does not proceed to Referendum, on the basis that it does not meet the relevant legal requirements.
Referendum	Subject to a successful examination, there will be a referendum when the community are asked: "Do you want South Downs National Park Authority to use the neighbourhood plan for Clapham to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?" If over 50% of those who vote say yes, the CNDP will be adopted by the SDNPA.
