# Recommendation: The Committee is recommended to

- I) Receive the project evaluation
- 2) Endorse the recommendation for learning at paragraph 3.1

#### I. Summary and Background

1.1 During and at the end of large projects, and following completion of projects funded by the South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA) Strategic Fund, evaluations are carried out. They help the SDNPA to be more effective and make best use of the resources it devotes to project work as well as making sure we get better outcomes from future projects. Learning from projects is part of an overall approach to performance improvement and learning. This report presents one project evaluation for consideration, the South Downs Alphabet Book. The Committee is asked to consider the evaluation report and endorse the recommendation for learning at paragraph 3.1

#### 2. The Alphabet Book

- 2.1 This project involved young people working with the University of the Third Age in exploring, researching, discovering and being inspired by the special qualities of the South Downs. It used Eleanor Farjeon's 1939 A Sussex Alphabet as a lens through which to view the modern day National Park and brought the work of this lesser known writer to a new generation of people.
- 2.2 The total project cost was projected to be  $\pounds$ 91,000. This included a grant from HLF for  $\pounds$ 18,500, funding from SDNPA of  $\pounds$ 14,100 and match funding and in-kind support to the value of  $\pounds$ 58,350. The final project cost was  $\pounds$ 78,397 as in-kind support was slightly lower than anticipated at  $\pounds$ 45,950. This was reflected in the reduced amount of time commitment needed by expert volunteers to complete the tasks required.
- 2.3 This project represented good value for money for the SDNPA achieving very high levels of engagement across a wide audience that was new to the SDNP. It also generated new curriculum focused resources for the Learning Zone. The project has resulted in two beautifully printed books which are being retailed at outlets across the SDNP as well as online. It has been agreed that £1 from the sale of each book will be donated to the South Downs Volunteer Ranger Service and contribute to ongoing conservation of the heritage in the SDNP. The sale and marketing of the books is being managed directly by Snake River Press. The evaluation report is at **Appendix 1**.

#### 3. Corporate learning

3.1 The corporate learning from evaluations is pulled together and reviewed by relevant staff and Themed Programme Boards. Where it is significant it is added to the improvement plan. The Committee is asked to note the recommendation in the evaluation report. This recommendation has some corporate applicability and the potential requirement for audience research will be added to the list of things those developing projects and projects managers need to consider when putting together projects that have this type of focus.

### 4. Policy and Programme Committee considerations

4.1 The project was approved in 2015and reported to the Governance Committee as part of regular project reporting, the last time this happened was in <u>February 2017</u>. It was also reported to Policy and Programme Committee as part of annual project reporting in <u>May 2017</u> and <u>appendix</u>.
