The Public Rights of Way (PRoW) network



In addition WSCC:

- has permissive agreements with landowners giving access either on foot, by bike or on horse to 31km of additional paths
- Manages 45km of G class highways, primarily used for leisure



The Public Rights of Way (PRoW) network





Highway Authority's (WSCC) responsibilities

Statutory responsibilities include:

- Maintenance of surfaces and most bridges and boardwalks
- Signing rights of way from roads
- Enforcement work; working with landowners so they comply with the law
- Correct line on the ground
- Recording rights of way on the Definitive Map





Landowner responsibilities

- Maintenance of existing stiles and gates (must obtain consent from Highways Authority for new stiles/ gates)
- Keep rights of way free from obstructions and overhanging (including side) vegetation
- Not to plough paths at the edge of fields and to keep cross field paths free from crops
- Not to keep dangerous animals where a right of way passes
- Not to deter or endanger the public






Managing Rights of Way

- Routine Inspection and Maintenance 15 month cycle, by parish.
 Volunteers assist with inspections (2017: maintenance contractor replaced/repaired 1580 signs and 145 bridges and boardwalks).
- Problem reports Investigation of high priority problem reports outside I&M programme, other logged to be investigated during routine inspection
- Summer Clearance Programme surface vegetation (over 300km cut annually, in addition to clearance as part of routine maintenance)
- Volunteers tasks –additional work such as bridges/boardwalks, steps, vegetation clearance etc. (2017: 3,500hours on 56 task days)
- Gates for stiles programme (2017: WSCC supported removal of 39 stiles)
- Capital programme Major surfacing and bridge works (2017: £122,174 and £173,437 respectively)


Managing PRoW (continued)

- Planning Consider planning applications affecting PRoW and Local Plan documents, including Neighbourhood Plans
- Definitive Map changes Diversions, adding new routes through 'claims' and negotiation
- England Coast Path working with Natural England
- Rights of Way Improvement Plan Duty to publish under CRoW Act 2000

The legal powers of Town and Parish Councils regarding access and PRoW

These include:

- Definitive Map To hold for public inspection
- To undertake maintenance of any footpath, bridleway or restricted bridleway
- To erect lighting on any footpath or bridleway
- To erect signs warning of local dangers
- Obstruction of the highway To prosecute anyone who wilfully obstructs / ploughs or crops a path
- Waymarking To insist that the highway authority signposts a particular right of way or to signpost FPs, BWs, RBs and BOATs on behalf of, and with the consent of, the highway authority
- To create new highways by agreement with the landowner



How Parish and Town Councils can help

- Build links with the local Access Ranger liaise with them over PRoW issues
- **Report issues accurately** with relevant information e.g. location, photos, where issues originate from etc, and understand our timescales for investigating issues.
- Assist with landowner issues If the landowner is known you can contact them to try to resolve issues before escalating to WSCC.
- Work with WSCC to gain improvements both to existing and creation of new PRoWs, via the planning system.
