Parish Priorities Statement



Introduction

During the last 3 years Easebourne Parish Council and a group of volunteer parishioners expended considerable time developing a Parish Design Statement (PDS) which was finally adopted by the South Downs National Park Authority (SDNPA) on 9 February 2023 as a Supplementary Planning Document. This document sought to highlight the relevant concerns of local residents about the way in which future planning applications will be assessed. To quote Vanessa Rowlands, SDNPA Chair "This Parish Design Statement, with landscape at its heart, is a testament to the community's involvement, allows them to be heard and provides a design framework to which future residents can aspire".

Since the adoption of our PDS, the SDNPA has undertaken a Local Plan Review (LPR). In light of the need to adapt to revised circumstances, the SDNPA has suggested parishes such as Easebourne that are wholly within the National Park can, by completing a Parish Priorities Statement (PPS), assist in developing the evidence base for the LPR. A PPS is intended to allow parish councils to set out their aspirations for the future and identify any relevant local issues; Easebourne Parish Council believes we have summarised the key requirements and predominant opinions of our parishioners. Our concern has been to support Local Plan objectives which emphasise heritage, landscape, wildlife habitats and protection/provision of opportunities for residents and visitors to enjoy and value the National Park assets. In addition, we acknowledge the importance of conserving and enhancing ecosystem services to contribute to the Park's wealth and the health and wellbeing of residents, visitors and businesses. By supporting these objectives we hope to ensure the provision of jobs, affordable housing, local facilities and economic viability in a sustainable and eco-friendly environment.

What type and level of development would you like to see in the parish?	 Improve the maintenance of common areas Improve the parish and villages entrances with native planting. Develop community facilities in line with the current aesthetic and business and recreational need Explore options for providing a community hall to act as an Easebourne village hub

Information required	Response
What type of homes would you like to see in your local community?	 'Truly affordable housing for young people' in preference to 'a retreat for wealthy old people'. Small-scale context-sympathetic quality housing built to match existing old housing stock' and in line with the Parish Design Statement (PDS).
What size of home is needed locally?	Prioritising a mix of affordable homes for young families, with provision to support a range of different life-styles, catering to those who work the land and those in clerical occupations. Max 50 words
Any other requirements?	Homes should facilitate community, we will champion strengthening community. Max 100 words

Information Required	Response
Are there any areas of local character which are particularly important to the local community?	 Mill Bridge, the housing between the A286 and the A272 are areas with distinct character. The hamlet of Henley is a heritage site, with over half the buildings are Grade 2 Listed and date back to 1575 or earlier. Easebourne village has a Conservation Site comprising a significant part of Easebourne Street and the buildings around the Pariory. The Cowdray ruins are a highly valued part of the Easebourne landscape, as are views across the golf course. The BP garage is seen as disfiguring and not in-keeping with the Parish aesthetic.

Information Required	Response
Opportunities to make nature bigger, better and more joined up	Investigate options within the scope of the Parish Council for enhancing our very valuable natural environment. Improved options for humans and wildlife to cross the A272 and A286 without further 'suburbanising' the Parish with street furniture. Max 100 words

Information Required	Response
Information about business you would like to protect and business opportunities that should be provided	Explore options for facilities that encourage the development of small business, retail and leisure. Max 100 words

Public spaces

Information Required	Response
Public Open Spaces, Public Realm, Pocket Parks	• There are extensive open spaces in the Parish, all of which are valued by the responders, most notably Easebourne Park and Cowdray Ruins. Max 100 words

Infrastructure

Information Required	Response
Active travel priorities, roads/parking, community buildings, needs, waste water infrastructure, broadband, renewable energy.	 Explore options for traffic-calming measures and better parking options and the easing the congestion over the Rother Bridge. A Community Hub or village hall was mentioned several times, as was improved accessibility to Easebourne Park. The resolution of poor drainage of the roads around the Rother Bridge effectively was raised.
